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ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1878.

In the year 1878 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon. There will also be a transit of Mercury across the face of the Sun.

FIRST.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun on the afternoon of February 2nd, visible as a partial one over nearly the whole of Australia, and as an annular one in Tasmania. The central line passes from Tasmania through the Antarctic Ocean, not far from the South Pole. On the east coast of Australia, from latitude 30° S. to Cape York, no portion of the eclipse will be visible. At Melbourne a partial eclipse will be seen, though at the time of greatest obscuration nearly the whole of the dark face of the moon will be projected on the disc of the sun. The phases will take place as follows :—

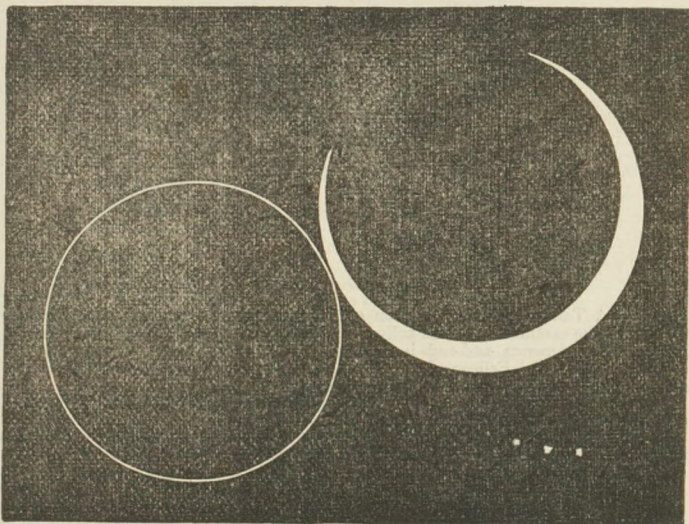

• ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, FEBRUARY 2ND, 1878, AT MELBOURNE.

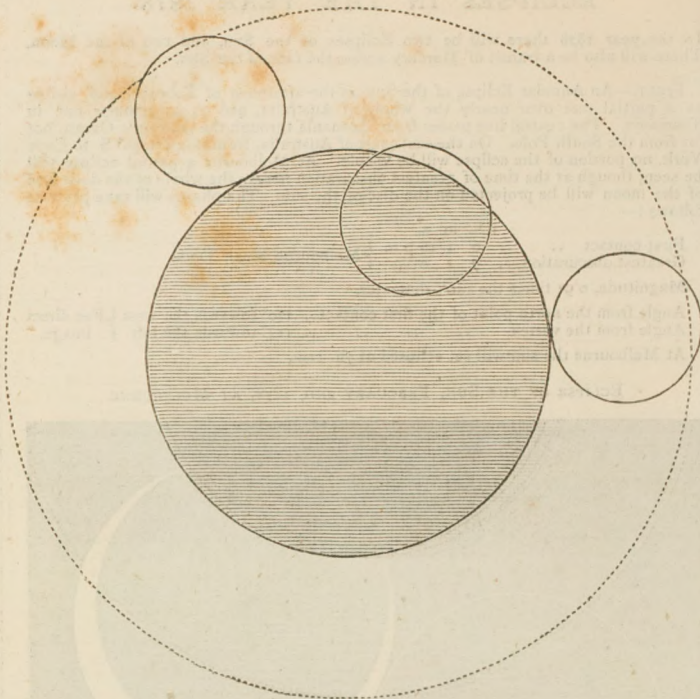


SECOND.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon on the evening of February 17th, visible throughout Australia. At Melbourne the times will be as under:—

The last contact with the shadow takes place at 30° from the north point, towards the west. At Melbourne the first contact takes place at 141° from the vertex, towards the right.

THIRD.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun on the morning of July 30th, invisible in Australia. The central line of this eclipse passes through north-eastern Asia, nearly bisecting North America, and ends in the West Indies.

FOURTH.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon on the morning of August 13th, partly visible in Western Australia, but invisible in Victoria.

A Transit of Mercury across the sun's disc takes place on the morning of May 7th, the end of which will be visible in Victoria.

At Melbourne the sun will rise with Mercury on his face at 6h. 47m., the internal contact at egress takes place at 8h. 26m., and the last contact at 8h. 29m. The last contact takes place at 100° from the north point of the sun, towards the west.

The Australian Seasons, 1878.

AUTUMN commences on March 21st. | SPRING commences on September 23rd.
 WINTER on June 21st (the shortest day). | SUMMER on Dec. 22nd (the longest day).
 From observations made at the Melbourne Observatory, extending over a number of years, it appears that, on the average, the hottest period is from the 21st to the 25th of January, and the coldest from the 20th to the 24th of July. These periods will, therefore, be the natural midsummer and midwinter.

Explanation of the Calendar.

SUN'S RISING AND SETTING.—These numbers show the mean time when the sun's centre, elevated by refraction, appears above the horizon, the eye being on a level with that plane.

MOON'S RISING AND SETTING.—The same as for the sun, only that the moon is more depressed by parallax than elevated by refraction. When the mark — occurs, it shows that the moon will only rise or set that day. Thus, on the 14th of January the moon will only rise at Melbourne. This arises from the lunar day being longer than the solar. The moon sets on the 13th at two minutes before midnight; the next night she does not set till thirty-three minutes past midnight—that is, thirty-three minutes after the commencement of the 15th.

PHASES OF THE MOON.—The times are here given when the moon is respectively 0° , 90° , 180° , and 270° of longitude from the sun. *Apogee* is the time of her greatest distance from the earth, and *Perigee* is the time of her nearest approach.

SUN'S DECLINATION.—These quantities show the angular distance of the sun's centre from the equator, measured on a meridian. They are given for apparent noon, or the instant of the sun's transit over the meridian of Melbourne, and are very useful for determining the latitude by meridian altitudes, for which purpose they will serve, without reduction, sufficiently near for most nautical purposes, the whole of the Australian coast. Thus, suppose on the 1st of January the altitude of the sun's lower limb at meridian transit had been observed to be $73^\circ 22'$, the height of the eye being eighteen feet above the level of the sea, and the instrument having an index correction of $+4' 0''$, the computation will stand thus:—

The proper way of applying the declination may be easily inferred from the circumstance that the sun is vertical when on the meridian of that place whose latitude is the same as the declination. As the sun was observed to be $16^\circ 22' 5''$ to the north of the zenith, the place of observation must be situated so much to the south of where the sun was vertical; if the sun had been observed to the south of the zenith, the latitude would have been $6^\circ 39' 57''$ S. If the above observation be made on the meridian of Melbourne (145° E. of Greenwich), the latitude thus obtained would be quite correct; for any other meridian, the declination would require a correction, which might be easily obtained by interpolation. But the maximum error of latitude caused by the neglect of this correction will be less than two miles, between the limits of Cape Leuwin and New Zealand.

THE SUN'S SEMI-DIAMETER is used to reduce an observation of his limb to his centre.

EQUATION OF TIME.—This is the difference between true solar and mean solar time; it is used to find the latter from an observation of the sun. Thus, suppose on the 1st of January a sun-dial, or any other solar instrument, gave the time 2h. 36m., to get the mean time (which is that shown by a well-regulated common clock or watch), we add 3m. 44s., which makes the mean time 2h. 39m. 44s. If the observation had been made at noon, we should have added 3m. 41s., the same as in the column; for any other time than noon, the equation may be easily found by interpolation. For sun-dial purposes, however, the equation at nearest noon will be sufficiently exact.

THE RIGHT ASCENSION OF THE MEAN SUN is the angular distance in time of the mean or fictitious sun from the first point of Aries at mean noon. It is the sidereal time at mean noon, or that which should be shown by a sidereal clock when the mean-time clock points to 12 at noon. It is used to find the mean time from the sidereal, or the reverse. Thus, suppose the right ascension of Sirius to be 6h. 39m. 46s.; this therefore will be the sidereal time when Sirius is on the meridian; subtracting from this the sidereal time at the previous noon, we shall have the interval of sidereal time that has elapsed since the preceding noon; which, by means of the sub-

sidial table, given for the purpose of converting sidereal into mean time, may be easily reduced into an interval of mean time, thus giving the mean time of the meridian passage of Sirius; or, suppose on the 1st of January an altitude of Sirius had been observed which showed that the star was 3 hours to the east of the meridian, the sidereal time would therefore be 3h. 39m. 46s.; subtracting from this 18h. 42m. 25s., having first increased the former by 24 hours, we get 8h. 57m. 21s. for the sidereal interval since noon; subtracting from this 1m. 28s., taken from the table, we obtain 8h. 55m. 53s. for the mean time of the observation. By means of the table of *Semi-Diurnal Arcs*, the mean times of the rising and setting of the heavenly bodies may be found in a similar manner. If the right ascension of the true sun is required, it may be found by applying the equation of time to the right ascension of the mean sun. Thus on the 1st of January the right ascension of the mean sun is 18h. 42m. 25s., and that of the true sun is 18h. 46m. 6s.

THE MOON'S AGE is the interval elapsed at mean noon since the last new moon; it is given in days and decimal parts of a day.

MOON'S MERIDIAN PASSAGE.—This is the mean astronomical time at which the moon's centre passes the meridian, or due north of Melbourne. It is very useful for finding the time of high water. The symbol ζ near the time of new moon shows that the moon will not pass the meridian on that day, the astronomical day beginning at noon, twelve hours after the commencement of the civil day.

HIGH WATER AT WILLIAMSTOWN.—The time of this table is civil mean time. It has been computed for Gellibrand's Point, on the assumption that the change tide takes place at 2h. 31m., as deduced by the late Captain Cox, R.N., from a discussion of the tide-gauge papers for the year 1860. When the mark — occurs, there will be only one tide that day. Thus on the 16th of January there will only be an afternoon's tide. The times here computed may be taken as the average ones when high water may be expected; the tides at Port Phillip, however, are so influenced by winds and other causes that the actual times of high water will sometimes differ from the calculated ones by more than three hours.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month is generally too hot and dry to admit of much being done in gardening operations, except in low, moist situations, where cropping can be carried on almost at any time. Where water is plentiful and easily applied, young crops should be watered once or twice a-week, care being taken that the soil be well stirred with the Dutch hoe after every watering. If rain or dull weather occur, a few cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, broad and kidney bean, lettuce, pea, onion, radish, and turnip seeds may be sown to a limited extent; with the exception of the peas and beans, all the seeds should be slightly protected from the intense sun, Early potatoes should be planted for use in April.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Dahlias and roses should be looked after; the former requiring staking, disbudding, mulching, and watering; the latter to be pruned when necessary, so as to give a fine autumn bloom; decayed flowers should be removed, and every means used to render the plant vigorous. Carnations should be layered. Chrysanthemums, phloxes, and other herbaceous plants will want staking and thinning.

FARM.—Farmers will be busy harvesting the grain crops; when the ground is cleared, lose no time in ploughing or scarifying the stubble, to destroy weeds. If the weather permit, turnips might be sown, and would yield good feed for sheep, and

a good dressing of manure. Mangolds, carrots, and other root crops must be kept clean by horse-hoeing.

Astronomical Notices of the Planets.

The sun is in the constellation Sagittarius till the 19th, when he enters Capricornus; his distance from the earth at noon of the 1st is 90,302,000 miles; this is nearly his closest approach to the earth, as he was in Perigee only fourteen hours previously. Venus, Mars, and Saturn are now visible in the evenings. KITCHEN GARDEN.—Sow cabbage, cauliflower, early horn carrot, brocoli, lettuce, peas, radish, spinach, and turnip. Kidney potatoes may still be planted. Earth up celery. Top-dress asparagus beds with salt or seaweed. If new strawberry beds are required, plant runners as soon as you can obtain them; three-year-old beds should be destroyed.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Dahlias, hollyhocks, lilioms, and Pompon chrysanthemums will now be in their prime; liquid manure will prolong and enhance the beauty of these flowers; dead blooms must be picked off, or the plants will be impoverished. This is the best month to sow hardy annual and perennial flower seeds. Prepare your ground for planting shrubs, ornamental trees, &c.; if not already trenched, get it done at once. Herbaceous plants can be divided, and planted where wanted; carnations and pinks may still be propagated by cuttings under a bell glass.

FARM.—Ploughing will chiefly occupy the farmer's attention. Plough deep—the extra expense is trifling compared with the benefits derived. In some districts wheat-sowing will commence; see that the finest and cleanest samples of seeds are selected, and do not neglect to dress by using a solution of blue vitriol, at the rate of 1lb. to the sack.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Finish manuring and digging ground ere winter sets in. Take care that young crops of turnips and carrots are kept free from weeds. Continue planting out cabbages, cauliflower, and celery; the latter would be much benefited by an occasional dose of guano-water. Sow peas (early varieties), broad beans, onions, parsley, endive, radish, and spinach. Plant potato-onions, shallots, garlic, rhubarb, and horse-radish. Earth up celery as required. Look to your herb bed; where necessary, divide the roots, and make fresh plantations. If strawberry runners were not planted last month, let them be this.

FLOWER GARDEN.—This is one of the busiest months in the year: most kinds of evergreens, and ornamental and flowering shrubs, are best transplanted now, and any alterations that are to be made in laying out grounds should be commenced. Take up gladioli, lilliums, and other bulbs that have done flowering; store them away in boxes, packed in dry sand. Finish planting hyacinths, tulips, crocuses, narcissi, anemones, ranunculi, ixias, &c. Renovate edgings of camomile, thrift, box, and thyme. For new plantations of roses the ground should be trenched and heavily manured; if light soil, some stiff loam should be incorporated with it. Propagate by cuttings any kind of soft-wooded plants you wish to increase; bell or hand glasses are required for this purpose.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Asparagus, rhubarb, and sea-kale beds will want cleaning and manuring. Sow broad beans, peas, lettuce, onions, radish, and spinach, for successional crops. Plant out early cabbages and late sowings of celery. Finish manuring and digging all vacant ground, whether wanted for immediate use or not; bear in mind that turning over ground in a wet state does it more harm than good. If ground is wanted for other purposes, carrots, parsnips, and other tap-rooted vegetables may be taken up and stored.

FLOWER GARDEN.—As dahlias and hollyhocks die off, the stalks should be cut down and cleared away; the former being taken up and housed in a dry shed or cellar. Look over your seedling, annual, and other plants; thin them where thick; and keep slugs and other vermin away. Prune perpetual flowering, banksian, and other spring-blooming roses. Continue planting evergreens, and flowering and ornamental shrubs; stake the same when necessary. Propagate by cuttings fuchsias, roses, &c. Attend to hedges, keeping them well clipped; if new ones are required, use hawthorn, furze, osage orange, or acacia, where strength is required; if light, small hedges are wanted, the small-leaved prickly acacia, Cape broom, sweet briar, or pittosporum, are the best.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Get all heavy work in the most forward state possible. This is the best month for planting all descriptions of fruit trees; trenching and deep draining are essential to their well-doing; if soil is poor and manure be needed, use bone-dust in preference to guano. Commence pruning fruit trees, beginning with those which have lost their foliage. Sow, to a limited extent, cabbages, cauliflowers, brocoli, early carrots, lettuces, and radishes. Make good sowings of broad beans, peas, and leeks. Finish planting garlic, shallots, horse-radish, rhubarb, sea-kale, and asparagus.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If possible, finish planting all kinds of trees; choose calm, dull weather for the purpose of transplanting, and take care that the roots are mutilated as little as possible. This is a good time for sowing grass seeds for lawns and borders. Dig neatly your flower beds, adding, if necessary, a little well-rotted manure. Finish pruning roses, flowering shrubs, &c. Old rose stools, that have been standing for years, should be taken up and replaced with young, vigorous plants.

FARM.—Sow barley and oats largely, either for hay or seed. Continue sowing beans and peas. Prepare land for mangolds, carrots, potatoes, maize, sorghum, chicory, tobacco, &c. The deeper the ground is worked, the better will be the crop. On rainy days, numerous jobs indoors may be done, such as mending and making pig troughs, hurdles, gates, &c.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Plant largely of early potatoes; sow parsnips upon rich deep soil—the latter ought to have been trenched two feet or more. Sow peas largely—Bedman's dwarf, blue imperial, champion of England, Burbidge's eclipse, climax, and alliance are among the best for general purposes. Sow largely of the various kinds of broad beans in rows thirty inches apart. Established plantations of rhubarb and sea-kale may be forced by covering the crowns over with pots or slates, and covering these again with fresh horse-manure. Plant globe artichokes in rich soil, in rows four feet six inches by three feet. Sow main crops of onions, also spinach, radish, and small salads.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If former directions have been carried out, there will not remain much to be done this month, with the exception of keeping all the walks, borders, and beds neat and clean.

FARM.—Continue ploughing and harrowing lands intended for spring cropping. Hoe drill crops. Continue sowing grasses, clover, lucerne, and peas; beans may still be sown in late localities. Oat and barley sowing should be completed this month if the weather has been at all favourable.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This month will close the season for planting fruit trees, &c., so that all diligence must be used. August is the chief month for sowing seeds of various kinds—such as cabbage, cauliflower, carrot, leek, lettuce, onions, parsley, parsnip, peas, radish, spinach, salsafy, and scorzonera. If frames are obtainable, make up hot-beds for early cucumbers, melons, vegetable marrows, &c. Tomatoes may be sown in pots in a frame for planting out in October. Plant Jerusalem artichokes and main crop of potatoes. Plant out cabbages, cauliflowers, leeks, onions.

FLOWER GARDEN.—If the manuring and digging of the flower garden be not completed before now, it should be attended to at once. Tall-growing annuals will require tying up. Propagate fuchsias, chrysanthemums, and climbers from cuttings. Repot plants commencing growth and wanting pot-room. Dahlias for early flowering may be started in a little bottom heat; seedling nemophilas, larkspurs, clarkias, &c., may be transplanted if too thick.

FARM.—Potato planting may be commenced now, but September is the principal month for getting in the main crops. English barley can still be sown. Oat and wheat crops should be rolled. Prepare land for sorghum, beet, and mangold crops.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—This is the busiest month in the year for seed-sowing; most of the hardy vegetables may be sown, and towards close of month all the tender sorts. Potatoes of all kinds should be planted for main crops. Make a sowing of peas for succession. Early longpod beans may still be sown in low-lying ground. Sow scarlet runners, dwarf French beans, beet, carrot, cucumber, melon, vegetable marrow, pumpkin, onion, radish, and spinach; mustard and cress should be sown every fortnight; sow celery on a hot-bed. Tomatoes and capsicums may be sown in warm situations; if any have been raised in a hot-bed, harden a little and plant out. Plant Chinese yams and sweet potatoes in well-trenched soil. Fruit trees will require attention; with the finger and thumb displace any superfluous shoots, and, if time can be spared, the blossom buds should be thinned, especially of young trees.

FLOWER GARDEN.—The floriculturist has generally numerous insect pests to annoy him in this month, such as green and black fly, red spider, scale, and thrip, to say nothing of slugs, caterpillars, &c. Gishurst's compound will be found the best remedy for the former. Plant out calceolarias, cupheas, geraniums, heliotropes, pansies, salvias, &c. Sow both tender and hardy annuals.

FARM.—Sow carrots, chicory, maize, mangolds, parsnips, and tobacco. Plant

potatoes. Lucerne and grasses can still be sown. Keep the horse-hoe at work between drilled crops, and plough in weeds on fallow ground.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—If season be moist, carrots, leeks, onions, and parsnips may still be sown. Sow largely of kidney beans, early turnips, capsicums, tomato, cucumber, vegetable marrow, pumpkins, melons, and parsley; also tall-growing varieties of peas—they will not grow very high at this season of the year. Plant out largely cabbage, cauliflower, brocoli, and celery; also, sow again for succession. Weeds will grow apace—choose a fine sunny day for hoeing them down, and rake off when withered, to prevent their starting into growth again.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Balsams, cockscombs, globe amaranthus, zinnias, and other tender annuals, should now be sown, if not already done; if sown in pots, and transplanted into flower beds, place in sunny weather an empty flower-pot over the patches of young plants; remove the pots every evening, or the plants will grow up weak and spindling. Climbing plants will be growing fast, and will require constant trimming and training. See that flower-beds are kept filled, by turning out large plants in pots.

FARM.—This is the last month that potatoes can be planted, except in low-lying lands. Sow largely of maize and sorghum; mangold-sowing should also be completed. Earth up early crops of potatoes with double-breasted plough, without delay.

KITCHEN GARDEN.—Beds of rhubarb and sea-kale that have been forced should be cleared off. Cease cutting asparagus, or you will weaken the roots. Attend to cucumbers and melons; if any have missed, sow again. Stop leading shoots of cucumbers, to induce laterals. If tomatoes are not planted against a wall or fence, they should be tied up to strong sticks and pruned moderately, or fruit will be small and few. This is the time for preventing a great deal of pruning in winter. Use the finger and thumb judiciously in disbudding and stopping fruit trees; thin the fruit where thick; increased size and superior flavour will be the result. Vines will require frequent attention as regards training, tying, and thinning shoots.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Hybrid perpetual roses should have their shoots pruned back immediately they have bloomed. Newly-planted shrubs or plants suffering from hot sunshine should be protected by boughs of tea-tree or wattle. Empty casks, with both ends knocked out, make very good shelters, although rather unsightly. At close of month budding may be proceeded with. Flower seeds can still be sown, although with greater risk of their well-doing than if sown earlier.

FARM.—In some districts harvesting will have commenced, and farmers generally will have little time to attend to growing crops of mangolds, potatoes, &c.; but if

Mercury will be visible in the evenings after the middle of the month. Jupiter and Saturn are visible in the evenings. KITCHEN GARDEN.—Cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, and savoy may be sown in shady places; peas, kidney beans, lettuce, spinach, and turnips can also be sown, but not to any extent. Onions, carrots, and parsnips will require thinning and weeding. Matured onion bulbs should be harvested at once, or the sun will injure them for keeping. Plant out early celery plants in trenches, and give abundance of water when established. Early potatoes for seed, when ripe, should be taken up and greened, by exposing them to the atmosphere for a few days, under the protection of a shed or verandah.

FLOWER GARDEN.—Bulbs that have flowered and died away should be taken up and packed in dry sand. This is the best month for planting out dahlias for autumn blooming. Roses and fruit trees may be budded. Newly-planted shrubs and trees will be benefited by having some rotted stable straw spread on surface of soil, which should first be well stirred.

FARM.—Wheat harvest will be getting general in earlier districts: both wheat and oats should be cut before being thoroughly ripe. If for malting, English barley should be fully ripe. Hoe and earth up potatoes.

The sun is in the constellation Scorpio till the 15th, when he enters Sagittarius; his distance from the earth at noon of the 1st is 90,532,000 miles; he will be at his greatest north declination at 3 p.m. of the 22nd, when the Australian summer commences. Mercury will be visible in the evenings during the first half of the month. Venus is now too near the sun to be visible. Mars is visible for a little time before sunrise. Jupiter and Saturn are visible in the evenings. On the 1st, Mercury sets at 8.44 p.m., Jupiter at 10.54 p.m., and Saturn at 1.24 a.m. Venus rises at 4.32 a.m., and Mars at 3.14 a.m. Venus will be in superior conjunction with the sun on the 6th. The moon will be near Saturn on the evening of the 3rd, near Mars on the morning of the 22nd, in the neighbourhood of Jupiter on the evening of the 26th, and near Saturn on the night of the 30th.

CALENDAR

Showing the Day of the Week and Month in any Year from 1800 to 1900.

EXAMPLE.—To ascertain the day of the week on which Christmas Day, 1875, will fall, look in the Table of years for 1875, opposite which will be found the letter C (termed the Dominical Letter); then look in the Table of Months, opposite December, for the same letter (C), and underneath the column containing it will be found the Calendar for December, 1875, which shows December 25 to be Saturday. When the Calendar for the Month is found, any other day of the week or month can easily be ascertained.

It will be observed that there are two letters opposite the Leap Year. The first letter is used for January and February, the second for the other months.

The Close Season for Emu, Black Swan, all kinds of Wild Goose, and for all other birds and animals included in second schedule of Act, from 1st August to 20th December; Quail, from 1st August to 31st January; Hares, from 1st Aug. to last day of February; Lyre Bird, 1st August to 31st January; Murray Cod, Murray Perch (golden), Murray Bream (silver), 15th October to 30th November.

NON-NATIVE GAME.—For Pheasants, Partridges, Grouse, Deer, White Swans, Antelopes, all birds not indigenous to Australia, and their produce, the Close Season extends over the whole year.

NINTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

GENERAL ELECTORAL ROLLS are made up on 1st September in each year, and Supplementary Rolls on 1st March. These days (*viz.*, 1st September and 1st March) are the last days respectively for the issue of electors' rights.

QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS.—(1) Freeholders of lands situated in any one and the same province, and rated at not less than £50 a-year, or double the amount in the aggregate if situated in separate municipal districts of the same province; (2) leaseholders similarly rated; (3) occupiers similarly rated; (4) joint owners or occupiers of property sufficient to give each the foregoing qualification; (5) mortgagors in possession; (6) graduates, legal and medical practitioners, ministers, schoolmasters, military and naval officers, and matriculated students. Rolls of ratepaying electors are made out in August of every year of all persons rated at £50. Those who are not on the rolls of ratepaying electors must take out electors' rights. These rights may be taken out by all persons duly qualified, and they will be in time for the Supplementary Rolls, compiled on 1st March.

PERIOD ELECTED FOR.—Three years, but Assembly may be dissolved by the Governor when he considers it expedient.

QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS.—Every male person 21 years of age (not subject to any legal incapacity), who shall be a naturalised or denizen subject of Her Majesty, and who shall have resided in Victoria for twelve months previous to 1st day of January or July in any year, and shall have been naturalised or made denizen at least three years, is qualified to vote for members of the Legislative Assembly, if he—(1) Resides in any electoral district, or (2) owns lands or tenements of the clear value of £50, or of the clear yearly value of £5, or (3) is upon roll of ratepaying electors. Persons in possession of first qualification, after having resided three months in district, must take out an elector's right by making personal application and paying 1s. to registrar of division in which elector resides; persons in possession of second qualification must take out an elector's right by making personal application and paying 1s. to registrar of division in which property is situate. All persons residing in city of Melbourne, or town of Geelong, or in any borough or shire, who pay rates, are entitled, without application, to be enrolled upon a roll of ratepaying electors for division of electoral district in which property is situated, whether the rates due upon such property are paid or not.



Postal Cards, &c.

Registration of Letters.

Any letter or packet not registered, and believed to contain money or other valuable enclosure, will be registered, and the fee for registration be charged on delivery; but if the person to whom the letter or packet is addressed open it in the presence of a postmaster, or officer of the post-office, and it be found not to contain money or other valuable enclosure, the fee in that case will be remitted.

Postal Cards.

INLAND CARD POST.

Post Cards, whether official or private, may be transmitted between places in Victoria under the following conditions:—

1. After the cards are issued there must be nothing written, printed, or otherwise impressed on the front side thereof, except the address, nor must there be any writing or printing across the stamp. On the reverse side any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed. Nothing whatever may be attached, nor may the card be folded, cut, or in any other respect altered. Adhesive stamps will not be accepted in payment of postage.

2. No card other than those issued by the Government, or a private card impressed with a penny stamp, under the special authority of the Postmaster-General, will pass under a penny stamp, if it bear on it a written communication of the nature of a letter.

3. Should a Post Card be observed to bear upon it anything of an obscene, libellous, or otherwise obviously objectionable nature, it will not be delivered.

4. When, owing to a great and unusual influx of letters, books, &c., the transmission or delivery of the letters would be delayed if the whole mail were dealt with without distinction, Post Cards may be kept back until the next despatch or delivery.

INTERCOLONIAL CARD POST.

Post Cards, whether official or private, will be transmitted by post to the neighbouring colonies if One Penny *additional* postage be affixed to them.

PRIVATE POST CARDS.

Conditions under which private cards will be received from the public and impressed with the One Penny Postage Stamp:—

1. At least a week's notice should be given by applicant of the number required to be printed; and the notice should be accompanied by a sample of the card required to be impressed.

2. The size of the Post Card is that technically known as "large message" (4½ inches long by 3 inches wide), and none but card of approved quality and colour, and of sufficient size to hold nine Post Cards on each sheet and no more, will be accepted; and each such sheet must not exceed 1½ ozs. in weight.

3. Not fewer than 120 sheets of card can be received at one time.

4. On each sheet presented for impression the applicant's name or monogram must be embossed or printed, and any printing must be thoroughly dry.

5. Official cards with the proper stamps thereon will be substituted for any private cards which may be spoiled in the operation of stamping.

6. Cards when impressed will be returned to applicant in sheets of nine impressions.

7. No fee charged for stamping.

8. Cash must accompany all cards sent in to be impressed.

9. No commission allowed upon private cards impressed for licensed vendors.

Money Orders.

Issued payable in Victoria, at following rates:—£5 and under, 6d.; above £5, but not exceeding £10, 1s.

Money Orders—Savings Banks—Electric Telegraph.

Money Orders issued payable in New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia, New Zealand, Queensland, and Tasmania, and also at all Money Order Offices in the before-mentioned colonies, payable in Victoria, at the following rates:—£5 and under, 1s.; £10 and under, 2s.

Money Orders issued at all Money Order Offices in Victoria, payable in Great Britain and Ireland, and at all Money Order Offices in United Kingdom, payable in Victoria, at following rates:—£2 and under, 1s.; £5 and under, 2s. 6d.; £7 and under, 3s. 6d.; £10 and under, 5s.

No Money Order will be issued for a larger sum than £10. Money Orders must be obtained between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.; Saturdays, 10 till 12. The Money Order Office at General Post Office will be kept open until 6 p.m. on day before English Mail is despatched, for issue of Money Orders on United Kingdom, for transmission by Mail.

TELEGRAPH MONEY ORDERS are issued and paid at all Telegraph offices in Victoria (except those on the Railway Circuit), and may also be forwarded to all Telegraph offices in South Australia, New South Wales, Tasmania, and Queensland, upon payment of following rates, including commission and charge for transmitting advice:—

Post Office Savings Banks.

The business of Post Office Savings Banks is conducted between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. daily (Sunday excepted), and between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. on Saturdays for the receipt of deposits only.

At the General Post Office, Melbourne, the Savings Bank is closed on Saturday at noon.

No deposits are received of less amount than 1s., nor of any sum not a multiple of 1s.

ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

Ordinary Hours of Business—8.30 a.m. to 8 p.m. The Melbourne Branch Office, Custom-house, closes at 6 p.m. Special rates are charged for private messages beyond these hours.

VICTORIA.—A uniform rate of 1s. for 10 words, and 1d. for each word additional, is now charged for all messages to and from Melbourne and any station in Victoria. Telegraphic messages from any station in Victoria may be sent by post as letters, for delivery in Victoria, or in any of the Australian colonies or New Zealand, without any payment for postage, if enclosed in the usual telegraph envelope, which must bear the frank-stamp of the Postmaster-General. Letters containing messages for transmission by telegraph from any place within Victoria, posted at any post-office not a telegraph office, with the words "Telegraphic Message only" written thereon, above the address, and directed to the nearest telegraph office, may be forwarded free of postage, provided the minimum fee of 1s. be paid thereon. No postage is now required on telegrams to be posted from stations in any of the adjoining colonies. Messages may be forwarded from and to any telegraph station in Victoria, at any hour during the night, on special notice being given at any telegraph station before 8 p.m.

PRESS TELEGRAMS.—Rates chargeable *within Victoria*:—Between 8.30 a.m. and 6 p.m.—10 words and under, 6d.; every additional word, ½d. Between 8.30 a.m. and 8 p.m. (for evening newspapers only)—100 words and under, 1s. 6d.; every additional 50 words and under, 6d.

MEDICAL NOTES.

SUMMER DIARRHŒA IN CHILDREN.

THE following precautions for the prevention of death from diarrhœa during the summer were suggested to the Central Board of Health by Dr. M'Crea, Chief Medical Officer :—

1. To exercise great care in excluding from children's food all unripe fruit, vegetables, and other articles which easily ferment. This need not exclude the moderate use of ripe fruit for children who have the teeth to masticate it.

2. To subject all the food which children eat to a boiling heat. In the case of infants, their milk particularly should never be given without having been previously boiled.

3. Whenever a child shows the first symptoms of diarrhœa, it should be at once stripped, enveloped in a cold wet sheet, and wrapped in blankets for several hours.

TYPHOID AND OTHER FEVERS.

TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF THE DISEASE.

DR. WM. BUDD supplies the following rules for popular use, and they have met with the approval of the Central Board of Health :—

The one great thing to aim at is to disinfect the discharges from the bowels on their very escape from the body, and before they are carried from the sick room.

This may be perfectly done by the use of disinfectants; one of the best is made from green copperas. This substance, which is used by all shoemakers, is very cheap, and may be had everywhere. A pound and a half of green copperas to a gallon of water is the proper strength. A teacupful of this liquid put into the nightpan every time before it is used by the patient renders the bowel-discharge perfectly harmless. One part of Calvert's liquid carbolic acid in 50 parts of water is efficacious.

All articles of bed and body linen should be plunged immediately on their removal from the bed into a bucket of water containing a tablespoonful of the chloride of lime, or M'Dougall's or Calvert's powder, and should be boiled before being washed. A yard of thin wide gutta percha, placed beneath the blanket, under the breech of the patient, by effectually preventing the discharges from soaking into the bed, is a great additional safeguard.

The privy or closet, and all drains communicating with it, should be flushed twice daily with the green copperas liquid, or with carbolic acid diluted with water.

In towns and villages where the fever is already prevalent the last rule should be put in force for all houses, whether there be fever in them or not, and for all public drains.

In the event of death the body should be placed as soon as possible in a coffin sprinkled with disinfectants. Early burial is on all accounts desirable.

As the hands of those attending on the sick often become unavoidably soiled by the discharges from the bowels, they should be frequently washed.

The sick room should be kept well ventilated day and night.

The greatest possible care should be taken with regard to the drinking water; where there is the slightest risk of its having become tainted with fever poison, water should be got from a pure source, or should at least be boiled before being drunk.

Immediately after the illness is over, whether ending in death or in recovery, the dresses worn by the nurses should be washed or destroyed, and the bed and room occupied by the sick should be thoroughly disinfected.

These are golden rules. Where they are neglected the fever may become a deadly scourge; where they are strictly carried out, it seldom spreads beyond the person first attacked.

SCARLET FEVER.

THE *Lancet*, calling attention to the importance of securing the early detection of cases of scarlet fever, says that the throat symptoms are the most trustworthy for the purpose of diagnosis in the initial stage of scarlet fever. The soft part of the palate is extensively reddened, and not merely the tonsils, as is the case in the first instance in ordinary sore throat. When this condition is met with, accompanied by a very hot skin and a very quick pulse, accompanied or preceded by sickness, with a thickly-furred tongue, red borders and prominent papillæ, a case of scarlet fever may be prepared for. In most cases sickness occurs within twenty-four hours after the commencement of the attack, and in a large proportion of cases it occurs within twelve or eighteen hours.

The following are the rules of the Board of Health on this subject:—

1. To prevent the spread of the disease, the patient should, for a period of at least eight weeks from the date of attack, be isolated as far as practicable from all communication with the other members of the household, or with any other persons.

2. As soon as a case of the disease is discovered, the room of the patient should be fumigated by burning sulphur therein, the windows, doors, chimney, or other apertures, being closed during the process, which should be conducted so as to thoroughly fill the room with the sulphur fumes. Furniture, bedding, and clothing in the room at the time not to be removed, but to be subjected to fumigation as they stand. Be careful to remove the patient from the room during the fumigating process.

3. The sick room to be afterwards kept cool and with the windows open until the period of desquamation, or peeling off of the skin, begins.

4. The apartments adjoining the sick room should also be from time to time subjected to sulphur fumigation.

5. Privy cesspools should be cleansed out, drains and yards kept scrupulously clean, and strict attention paid to the thorough cleanliness of the premises generally.

Dr. Thomson, of South Yarra, remarks as follows on the above rules:—“*The simple plan of washing and oiling the body, and changing the bed and body linen morning and evening, caring well*

for the soiled clothes, would, if duly carried out, leave in a month not a case of scarlet fever in the country. Every care bestowed on the surroundings of the sick will rarely, if ever, prevent, but a very little attention given to the patient's person will readily destroy contagion."

THE TREATMENT OF DIPHTHERIA.

THE following prescription, obtained from Dr. J. A. Moore, Tasmania, has been successfully employed in several hundred cases:— Take ipecacuanha powder, 20 grains; tartar emetic powder, 2 grains; mix. To be taken, for one dose, in a little water; at once, as an emetic.

Take Beaufoy's solution of chloride of soda, 1 oz.; water, 3 ozs.; mix. To be used as a gargle frequently.

Take muriated tincture of iron, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; water, 8 ozs.; mix. A tablespoonful in a wineglass of water three or four times a day.

The foregoing proportions are suited to an adult. The doses for children may be regulated, according to age, by the following table:—

Gaubin's Table.—Regulating the ordinary proportion of doses, according to the age of the patient. For an adult, suppose the dose to be 1, or 1 drachm. Under 1 year will require $\frac{1}{12}$ th, or 5 grains; under 2 years, $\frac{1}{8}$ th, or 8 grains; under 3 years, $\frac{1}{6}$ th, or 10 grains; under 4 years, $\frac{1}{4}$ th, or 15 grains; under 7 years, $\frac{1}{3}$ rd, or 1 scruple; under 14 years, $\frac{1}{2}$, or $\frac{1}{2}$ a drachm; under 20 years, $\frac{2}{3}$ rds, or 2 scruples; from 21 to 60, the full dose, 1, or 1 drachm. Above 60, an inverse gradation should be observed.

MR. GREATHEAD'S REMEDY.—Give four drops of sulphuric acid in a glass of water; mix the two well together by pouring out of one glass into another a few times; then give it to the patient to drink. The quantity will not hurt any one, and is also a good purifier of the blood. Any person can get for 6d. as much acid as will serve him for his lifetime.

THE ROYAL COMMISSION'S MODE OF TREATMENT.—The plan advocated by the Royal Commission on Diphtheria is to keep the apartment in which the patient is placed constantly filled with an atmosphere of the fumes of burning sulphur, as dense as the patient can bear, and to continue this night and day till some decisive effect is produced on the disease.

SNAKE-BITES.—An easy diagnosis of snake-bite, apparently not generally known, even by the faculty, is thus given in Krefft's *Snakes of Australia*:—Innocuous snakes, when they bite, leave marks thus:—

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Venomous snakes, when they bite, leave two punctures only, thus:—

SUNSTROKE.—When a person is seized with severe pains in the head, after exposure to the sun, and exhibits signs of an aberration of intellect, he may safely be supposed to be labouring under this disease. In that case, the person should, if out of doors, be removed to the nearest shady spot. Let the neck be uncovered, the head gently raised, and then trust entirely to dashing cold water upon the head and chest. Above all things, no bleeding. If in the house, but

not within reach of medical advice or assistance, the treatment should be the same. To bleed a person struck down by sunstroke is in all probability to kill him. Persevere with the cold water until consciousness is quite restored. Do not be disheartened. Use the water freely, especially over the chest, letting it fall in a full stream from a foot or two in height. Be not misled by the symptoms, which may seem to be those of apoplexy, and on no account permit a drop of blood to be drawn. Where the symptoms are not absolute prostration, but severe pains in the head and aberration of intellect, the patient should be closely watched, lest he make an attempt upon his own life. In all cases secure medical advice immediately.

VITAL STATISTICS OF VICTORIA.

ESTIMATED mean population of the colony during the year, 830,679, of whom more than one-half are dwellers in towns. The aggregation of the people in Melbourne is very marked, the population of the capital and suburbs being 247,079, the population of all the other towns in the colony amounting to 191,038. Melbourne city has 62,000 inhabitants. Emerald Hill takes rank as the most populous suburb, with 24,500; Collingwood coming next, with 21,800; and then Richmond, Hotham, Fitzroy, and Prahran.

Of the total number of marriages, only 357 were performed by lay registrars, the rest being according to the rites of some religious denomination. The Church of England heads the list with 1066, followed by the Presbyterians with 1037, the Roman Catholics with 824, and the Wesleyans with 736. There were 634 persons married who were unable to write their names—263 men and 371 women. Of these, 205 belonged to the Roman Catholic denomination—too high an average, 102 Church of England, 99 Presbyterian, 71 Wesleyan, and 1 Jew. The number of marriages celebrated during the last 11 years has been very nearly the same in each year, ranging from 4253 in 1866, to 4985 in 1875.

The number of births last year was 26,769, a proportion of 32·23 to every 1000 of the population—the lowest proportion reached during the last 11 years. The number of male children was 13,759, and of female 13,010. There were 197 cases of twins, and two of triplets. The proportion of illegitimate children was 1 in 26, or 975 out of the total of 26,769. There was an excess of births over deaths of 13,208.

The number of deaths during the year was 13,561, a proportion of 16·33 to every thousand of the population. Of males, 7716 died, and of females, 5845. The first six months were the most fatal months of the year, 7746 deaths having taken place in the first half of the year, as against 5815 in the latter part. Of the total number of deaths, 5412 were of children under 5 years, and 8149 of persons over that age. Among children of from 5 years to 10 the mortality amounted to 1227. Among youths, male and female, from 10 years to 20, there were 879 deaths. Among young people in the prime of life, from 20 years to 40, there were 1773 deaths; and among the middle-aged people, from 40 to 60, there were 2628 deaths. Of septuagenarians 544 passed away, and of octogenarians, 203.—*Abridged from Argus.*

For every person who leaves the world in New Zealand, three are born into it. In Melbourne last year, according to returns published by Mr. Girdlestone, the city health officer, the proportion was three deaths for four births.

EDUCATION.—The total number of children enrolled during the year 1876 was 231,560. The number under school age in State schools was 29,215, in capitation schools, 1927; total, 31,142; of school age in State schools, 166,169; in night schools, 5271; in capitation schools, 9764; total, 181,204; over school age in State schools, 9400; in night schools, 9251; in capitation schools, 563; total, 19,214. The average attendance for the year was 106,758, which is the largest number yet attained.

LAND SELECTION IN VICTORIA.—According to a report from the Land Office, selection is largely on the increase. During the seven months of the year which have elapsed 991,000 acres have been applied for, being an average of 125,000 acres per month, as against an average of 80,000 acres per month last year. Selection is most active in Melbourne, Benalla, and Kerang districts. In reply to the question whence the army of selectors comes from, the report says—“It must be remembered that 10,000 persons attain the age of 18 every year in Victoria, and that there is still a steady flow of South Australians into our North-western District.”

MINING.—The prospecting vote of last year—involving an expenditure of £4698 5s. 5d.—returned to the Minister of Mines 4 ozs. 14 dwts. 16 grs. of gold from the prospectors. Though not in favour of a prospecting vote this year, Mr. Berry has placed a sum of £5000 on the Estimates for the purchase and working of a diamond drill rock-boring machine.

A NOTE FOR HORSEMEN.—In reply to the question, “Which is harder on a horse, riding up or down hill?” we answer—1. It is the pace that kills. 2. Up hill tries the wind; down hill, the legs. No one has any business to ride fast up or down hill; if he does, the horse will knock up sooner on the up-hill journey, but will suffer more permanent injury from the down-hill one.

NOTES ON GARDENING.

PROPAGATION.—In a state of nature all plants are propagated from seed, and the multifarious forms of the seeds and envelopes with which they are provided is one of the many interesting subjects of investigation to the lover of nature. For our purpose it is sufficient to state that most seeds are covered with a hard shell or envelope, which protects them from external injury; that within this envelope lies the embryo plant. All seeds in this latent state contain an organ, or germ, which, under favourable circumstances, shoots upwards, and becomes the stem of the plant; another, called the radicle, which seeks its place in the soil, and becomes the root; and the seedlobes, which yield nourishment to the young plant in its first stage of growth. Moisture, heat, and air are necessary conditions for the development of all seeds; and most of them require, in addition, concealment from the light. It is found however that, except in the case of annuals (as plants raised from seed, which grow, produce their seeds, and ripen their fruit in one year, are called), much time is lost by following this mode of propagation; it is also found that the seed does not always produce the same identical plant. This has led to other methods of multiplying; for, besides the roots properly so called, which attach themselves to the soil, and draw from it the principal nourishment of the plant, it is found that each branch conceals under its outward covering a bundle of fibres or tissues, which, under favourable circumstances, develop roots, and become the basis of an independent plant, identical with that from which it sprang. Many plants have also a crown with buds or eyes, each capable of propagating its species. Every plant with roots of this description may be divided into as many portions as there are eyes, taking care that a few fibres are attached to the root, and each will become an independent plant. The potato, and all the bulbous and tuberous plants, are familiar examples of this principle of propagation; so are the dahlia and pæony, which grow better when the set is confined to a piece of the tuber, with one eye attached, than when planted whole. So conspicuous is this in the potato, that, where it is planted whole, all the eyes except one, or at most two, should be scooped out with a sharp knife, because the young plant will thus be supplied with more of its natural pabulum while it is rooting, and will increase its vigour. Other plants throw off short stems, like the daisy and house-leek, by means of which they are propagated. Others again, like the strawberry, throw off runners, each of which is furnished with its root-fibre already elaborated, only requiring soil in which to root itself. But there are others where nature requires the aid of art, and this has given rise to the operation which will be found explained under the article *Layering*.

LAYERING.—Layering, which consists in arresting the circulation of the sap on its return to the roots, is one of the most useful methods of propagation. In this operation an upward slit is made half across a joint; and by fixing the part so cut in favourable soil, the latent fibre expands into a root, and the branch becomes an independent plant. The process is well adapted for pinks, carnations, roses, and many other plants. It is, indeed, a very important operation in gardening, and should be neatly executed. Choosing the

suitable branch of the carnation, for instance, which is first stripped of all branches below the joint selected, and being furnished with a very sharp knife, the operator begins his incision a quarter of an inch below a joint, passing the blade through it in an oblique direction to a quarter of an inch above, taking care that the cut terminates as nearly as possible in the centre of the stem; the tip of the tongue thus made is cut off with a clean sharp cut, and the layer pegged down in a little fine rich mould, but not more than an inch under the soil. In the case of carnations, the plant is in a fit state for the operation as soon as the flowering season is over; and no stem which has already produced flowers should be employed for the purpose. In the case of roses, and other shrubby plants, all that is required is to run the knife sufficiently through a joint to make an opening or crack near it, and peg down the wounded part three inches below the surface of the soil, pressing the soil lightly round it, and leaving that part of the branch above the soil as erect as possible. The roots will soon form, and then the new plant may be separated from the parent tree.

CUTTINGS.—Cuttings in general may be considered as of two kinds, matured wood and young green shoots. The former, whatever they may be, strike readily, and with very little care. An American plan, which is very successful, is to lay them in slightly-damped moss, or to drop them lightly into a wide-mouthed bottle, having a piece of damp sponge at the bottom and a covering of muslin over the top. In either of these methods a callus is soon formed, and the cuttings readily throw out roots. Cuttings of young green shoots, however, require a very different treatment; they must be so managed as never to be allowed to flag; and the following appears to be the best method that can be pursued:—Put silver-sand about an inch deep into shallow pans (common saucers answer every purpose), and in these plant the cuttings. Then pour carefully upon the sand enough water to make a thin sheet about it. The lower leaves of the cuttings are to be removed before planting, and the stalk fixed firmly into the sand before the water is poured on. These tender young green shoots, or cuttings, will be better for a little shade and heat. A piece of thin muslin or tissue-paper will provide the former, and heat may be had by placing the pan of cuttings over a basin of hot water, refilled twice a day. These cuttings will be rooted and ready for potting off before the water in which they are grown has dried up.

DISBUDDING.—The object of disbudding is to remove all useless sprays not required for next year's branches, which would not, from their position, ripen into desirable fruit-bearing wood; it is, in fact, to relieve the tree from nursing wood that must be cut away in the autumn pruning; but it must be the care of the operator to avoid removing shoots well placed for future branches, or which would expose the tree to too severe a trial of its vital power.

PERENNIALS.—Those plants are called perennials which do not require annual cultivation. They are not woody, and generally die down to the ground every year, and spring up again the year following. Some, however, do not die down, but retain their leaves, as pinks, carnations, saxifrages; and these, on this account, are called evergreen perennials.

DRAINAGE.—However high and apparently dry a situation may appear, it is quite possible that it requires to be drained. The object of draining is not only to get rid of superfluous moisture, but also to prevent the little there may be from remaining stagnant. It is quite a common occurrence to find a piece of ground that is never too wet, but which is, nevertheless, sour and unfitted for the cultivation of delicate flowers. It should, therefore, be the first care of the florist to make drains from the highest part of the ground to the lowest, three feet from the surface, dug the shape of a V; and if there be no outlet at the lowest part, to dig a hole, or well, or pond, into which all these should lead, even when there is no apparent means of getting rid of the water. At the bottom of these drains a row of common 2-inch earthen pipes may be placed, end to end, and covered up again with the soil. These are too deep to cause any danger of disturbance in ordinary operations; and the effect is to let air into the soil, if there be no surplus moisture; and to prevent the lodgment of water anywhere: about a rod apart, in parallel lines, will be sufficiently close for the drains, and a larger drain along the bottom, or a ditch, may lead at once to the outlet or the receptacle for the water. Suppose, however, the soil is really surcharged with water, and there is no place but the pond made for the purpose into which this water can pass, and suppose, while we are imagining evils, that this pond or hole fills higher than the bottoms of the drains, it is obvious, in such cases, that the drains cannot empty themselves. Still, even such drains are of use; if they can only discharge all the water in the driest season, immense good is done by them. If the pond be not too large, a garden-engine may be set to work to lower the water by throwing it over the surface; and although it may fill as fast as the water is taken away, there is a circulation of water going on in the soil, instead of moisture being stagnant, and the ground made sour.

MULCHING.—This operation consists in spreading a layer of stable-dung over the roots of trees or plants, and in times of drought watering through it. After a time the dung may be forked into the soil.

GUMMING.—To get rid of gumming in fruit trees, scrape the gum clean away, wash well the place where it has accumulated, and stop it with a compost of horse-dung, clay, and tar.

IRON IN WATER.—Carefully avoid for gardening purposes all water impregnated with iron. No plants thrive well that come in contact with it.

To CHECK SNAILS AND SLUGS in time, commence soil-liming with the sowing of early seeds, when the days are sunny and the earth sufficiently dry to allow of working among the soil with freedom. Use hot or quick-lime liberally, and merely hoeing, raking, or pointing it on the surface; give good coatings of it also over strawberry drills, by boxwood edgings, the sides of walls, and on other vermin-harbours; renewing surface dustings frequently afterwards, when it becomes washed away, saturated, or inert.

VASES.—These may be introduced into pleasure-grounds, especially upon terraces, with very good effect. They can be filled with soil and planted, or pots of choice flowers can be set in them and changed as soon as the blossom begins to fade.

NEW AND USEFUL RECIPES, &c.

A SHEEP DIP.—For tick, use $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. arsenic to the gallon of water. For scab, 3 lbs. to 100 gallons water. You may save soda by making a lye of wood ashes, of which add as much to the water as may suffice to dissolve the arsenic. The lime and sulphur dip is made by boiling together until dissolved 2 ozs. of sulphur and 2 ozs. of lime to each gallon of water. The wool is not improved by using the lime and sulphur dip, but if intended to dip after shearing it may be employed without much injury.

LUCERNE.—Fifteen pounds of good seed should be enough for an acre of well-prepared rich land. Dodder is often introduced in lucerne seed; therefore, if the sample is not perfectly clean, work the seed thoroughly, before sowing, in a sieve which will just retain the lucerne and allow the dodder seed to pass through and fall on a calico sheet, not on any coarse material in which the minute seeds of the dodder might effect a lodgment and thus ultimately be transferred to the land. Be careful, also, that no portion of what falls through the sieve be taken up by the feet. If possible have the sifting done under your own inspection at the seedman's. This will save trouble.

SOOT AND WOOD ASHES AS MANURE.—Soot is a powerful manure, wood ashes also. They are adapted for culinary vegetables generally; soot is often applied as a special manure to the onion crop.

TO DESTROY ANTS.—Place an inverted garden-pot over the nest, and the ants will work into it. Remove the pot in a day or two, by placing a spade underneath it; then plunge it, with its contents, into boiling water; and repeat the process if necessary. Ants may be expelled from any particular plant by sprinkling it well with sulphur; they may also be kept away from wall-fruit, and other fruit while ripening, by drawing a broad band with chalk along the wall near the ground, and round the stems of the trees.

CHEAP FILTERING.—Take about half a pound of white worsted cut into lengths of about a foot, or any other woollen material cut into strips of an equal length, and suspend them all round a tub or other vessel containing the water to be filtered, and they will speedily empty it into any other vessel that may be placed underneath to catch it. These lengths of worsted or strips of cloths act as so many small syphons for draining off the water, and the principle on which the filtering process is carried out appears to be that the water ascends through capillary tubes, which will not admit of the passage of any foreign matter.

TO PREVENT MEAT FROM PUTRIFYING.—A solution of five parts of borax in 100 of water will, it is said, prevent the putrefactive process in meat for a considerable time. Flesh dipped in the mixture, and then dried, resists the usual process of decomposition.

TO KEEP APPLES.—Let them be well dried, and pack in a hamper, or box without lid, wrapped in straw, or covered with saw-dust, in layers. Keep in a cool place, and not exposed to frost. Apples should always be plucked when the weather is fine, and when packed they should not touch one another.

POISON IN MANGOLD LEAVES.—Cattle or pigs eating too freely of the green leaves of mangold wurzel are likely to be poisoned, as these leaves have been found to contain a large quantity of oxalic acid.

TO DISCOVER ALUM IN BREAD.—Heat a knife, and thrust it into a loaf or cake; if alum be present, it will partially coat the knife.

TO PURIFY RANCID BUTTER.—Let the butter be melted and skimmed as for clarifying; then put into it a piece of bread, well toasted all over. In a minute or two the butter will lose its offensive smell and taste.

SCURF IN THE HEAD.—A simple and effectual remedy. Into a pint of water drop a lump of fresh quick-lime the size of a walnut; let it stand all night, then pour the water off clear from sediment or deposit, add a quarter of a pint of the best vinegar, and wash the head with the mixture. It is perfectly harmless. Only wet the roots of the hair.

A PLATE POWDER.—Polisher's putty and burnt hartshorn, of each four ounces; prepared chalk, eight ounces.

REMEDY FOR LOOSE TEETH.—When the front teeth become loose without any apparent cause, a diseased state of the gums may be suspected. Sometimes—nay, often—the teeth may be set firm again by washing out the mouth three or four mornings running with tincture of myrrh, about a teaspoonful in a third of a tumbler of water. The following is also a good mouth wash:—Infusion of roses, six ounces; borax, one ounce; honey of roses, one ounce.

HOUSEHOLD BREWING.—To 3 gallons of water put $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of hops, and boil until they sink; then add 3 lbs. of white sugar and 2 ozs. of whole ginger (pounded up); then strain the whole into a bucket, and leave it till it becomes warm; then add two tablespoonfuls of yeast, and let it rest covered over in a warm place for 24 hours; then skim the yeast off, and put it into bottles and cork well. The best water to use is rain water. *Another Recipe.*—For five gallons of water take 3 ozs. hops, 2 ozs. whole ginger crushed, 3 lbs. of 4d. sugar, and 1 lb. $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. sugar; boil these for two hours; put into a cask two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar and a little isinglass; strain what has been boiled into the cask, and when milk-warm add two tablespoonfuls of good yeast. In winter stand in cask for four days, in summer two days, skimming freely; then bottle.

TO PREVENT DAMP WALLS.—To effectually prevent rain penetrating through walls, use 16 pounds of tallow to one bushel of best roche lime, slacked in bushels and laid on with a brush immediately. Melting the fat over the fire secures a smooth surface, which will not be if it is dissolved in the lime. Of course the walls must have three coats possessing the above proportions of lime and fat, adding colouring to the third coat to suit the taste.

HOW TO MAKE HENS LAY.—To three gallons of boiling water add one-half of an ounce of common salt, a teaspoonful of Cayenne pepper, and four ounces of lard. Stir the mixture until the pepper has imparted considerable of its strength to the water. Meanwhile the salt will have been dissolved and the lard melted. Then, while yet boiling hot, stir in a meal made of oats and corn, ground together in equal proportions, until a thick mush is formed. Before feeding, taste to see that you have not an overdose either of salt or pepper.

DOCKS.—Docks, as dandelions, may be got rid of by cutting off the tops as soon as they appear, and placing a little salt on the wound.

NOTABLE EVENTS.

OCTOBER—

1876.

17. The Electoral Bill passed its final stage in the Assembly.
19. Second reading of the Harbour Trust Bill agreed to without a division.
30. The Arctic Expedition, consisting of the "Alert" (Captain G. S. Nares) and the "Discovery" (Captain Stephenson), returned to Valentia, having found it impossible to reach the North Pole.

NOVEMBER—

4. Defeat of the Derby favourite Newminster (Mr. Chirnside's) by Mr. James Wilson's filly Briseis, the bookmakers netting many thousands of pounds. The Maribyrnong Plate was won by Sir Hercules Robinson's Habena.
6. Opening of the Academy of Music, Bourke-street east.
7. Melbourne Cup won by Mr. James Wilson's Briseis (the Derby winner).
9. The Oaks Stakes won by Briseis, who thus performed the unprecedented feat of a filly winning Derby, Cup, and Oaks.
17. The railway line from Sandhurst to Inglewood formally opened for traffic.
17. The Presbyterian General Assembly reversed the decision of the commission admitting Mr. Ewing as a minister of the church by 71 votes to 39.
20. Arrival in Melbourne of the All England professional cricketers.
30. The proposal of the Government to purchase the M. and H. B. Railway was affirmed by 35 votes to 33 in the Legislative Assembly. [On the 5th December the proposal was negatived.]

DECEMBER—

22. The Intercolonial Schools Cricket Match between Victoria and New South Wales resulted in favour of the Sydney boys by six wickets.
23. New Turkish Constitution promulgated, establishing Constitutional Government, with a Senate and Chamber of Deputies, and Ministerial responsibility; and providing for religious liberty and legal equality to all Ottoman subjects.
30. Victorian Fifteen defeated the All-England Eleven by 31 runs.

JANUARY—

1877.

7. Bishop Moorhouse (Bishop of Melbourne) arrived. The right rev. gentleman was installed on the 11th at St. James's Cathedral.
12. At a largely attended meeting of licensed victuallers in the Athenæum Hall, resolutions were passed pledging the publicans to keep their hotels strictly closed on Sunday; and an agreement to that effect signed by those present.
13. New South Wales Fifteen defeated the All-England Eleven by 2 runs and 13 wickets.
15. Railway trains run with carriage doors unlocked on the Williams-town line.

Notable Events.

JANUARY—

21. Severe shocks of earthquake felt at Maldon, Castlemaine, Campbell's Creek, Guilford, and Yandoit.
24. Two thousand sheep sold in the Adelaide market at 1s. per head.
25. Cable conference held at Sydney; Hon. J. Robertson (N.S.W.) chairman.
28. An American named William Marks, a ferryman on the Yarra, killed by a shark while bathing at Emerald Hill Beach.
29. Importations of cattle into England, France, and Belgium prohibited, owing to the extension of the cattle plague in Germany and Eastern Europe.
30. Afternoon musical performances initiated in the Victoria Arcade.

FEBRUARY—

5. Midhat Pacha dismissed, and Edhem Pacha appointed Grand Vizier.
5. Decisive victory of the Sabbatarian party in the polling for the election of officers of the Athenæum; the advocates for Sunday opening not returning a candidate.
9. The old Criterion Hotel, Melbourne, sold privately, by Messrs. Gemmell, Tuckett and Co., for £33,000.
9. Thirty miles of country, from Hawkesdale to Blackfellow's Creek, burnt by bush-fires.
12. In consequence of the inadequacy of the support rendered to the General Church Fund, Bishop Hale, of Brisbane, tendered his resignation, but withdrew it for twelve months at the request of the Bishop of Sydney.
13. The notorious Scott ("Captain Moonlite") stuck up Warder Kelly in his office at Pentridge, threatening to murder him with a large dinner knife.
15. A Mrs. Hickmott and her son Samuel killed by lightning at Wedderburn.
16. A man killed by lightning in Elizabeth-street.
17. Breaking-out of typhoid fever in the Children's Hospital at Carlton.
25. Over 20 inches of rain fell at Townsville in three days.
26. The thermometer registered 149 deg. in the sun at Brisbane.

MARCH—

2. Action for libel against the *Age* newspaper by Mr. Langton. The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff: damages, £1000—which were subsequently reduced to £750. A public subscription recouped Mr. Syme his expenses.
3. Mr. Knatchbull-Hugessen's bill legalising colonial marriages with a deceased wife's sister passed the second reading in the House of Commons by a majority of 51.
7. At the first general meeting of the Victorian Shipwrecked Relief Society, Martin A. Peterson and John Ekland, two of the boat's crew of the "Dandenong," were presented with handsome silver medals, awarded them by the Shipwrecked Fishermen and Mariners' Royal Benevolent Society of Great Britain.
17. Fourteen hundred sheep died at Tumbriebungie Reserve (near Dubbo, N.S.W.) in two days, from eating poisonous herbs.

Notable Events.

MARCH—

19. A combined eleven of Victoria and New South Wales defeated the All England Eleven by 45 runs. The colonial team were weakened by the defection of Allan and Evans—their two premier bowlers; though Bannerman more than compensated them by scoring 165 runs (the most ever made against Shaw) before he had to retire hurt.
30. First election of Harbour Trust Commissioners.

APRIL—

2. Fire brigade demonstration at Stawell. During the absence of the brigade, a fire broke out in the Cross Reef Hotel, which was totally consumed.
10. Meeting of sympathisers with sewing-machine girls held in the Mechanics' Institute, Ballarat. There was a large attendance, a number of women being present.
11. A proposition of Professor Andrew, to remove the University to a central site in the city, was negatived by the Senate, the division being 48 to 12.
13. Extensive fire at Clunes; damages, £6000.
13. Inauguration of Trinity College Literary Society. Mr. Edward Clarke Spicer, B.A., late senior student of the College, read a paper on "Literary Culture."
14. L'Estrange, the Australian Blondin, walked across the Middle Harbour, Sydney, on a rope, in the presence of 15,000 people.
14. Captain Stevens, of H.M.S. "Barracouta," dismissed from the service by a court-martial, for interference in native affairs at Samoa.
16. Terrible accident at the works in connexion with the new Murray Bridge. One of the "travellers" on the Murray side of the river, 50 feet from the ground, and on which seven men were working, suddenly fell, crushing them fearfully. Five subsequently died. The accident was brought about through loading too heavily on one side.
16. The goods of Messrs. L. Stevenson and Sons, seized twelve months ago for alleged under-valuation, sold by public auction at the Custom-house.
16. Sir William Cairns resigned as Governor of South Australia, owing to ill-health.
23. Ararat and Hamilton Railway opened as far as Dunkeld—47 miles from Ararat.
26. Russians advanced and crossed the frontier at Alexandropol, Asia Minor, and were routed next day in an engagement near Batoum, with a loss of 800 men.
26. In the House of Commons, Mr. Egerton stated that Hobart Pasha (an English gentleman, known in society as the Hon. Augustus C. Hobart, a younger son of the Earl of Buckinghamshire) had been informed that he could not be allowed to remain in the British navy and at the same time command a fleet which was hostile to a friendly Power. [His name was subsequently replaced on the Army and Navy List in consideration of past services.]
27. Foundation-stone of the Warrnambool Breakwater laid.

Notable Events.

APRIL—

27. Colonel P. H. Scratchley, of the Royal Engineers, arrived by the "Tanjore." In conjunction with Sir William Jervois (who arrived by the Torres Straits mail on the 28th), he was to report with regard to colonial defences.

MAY—

2. Hobart Pasha ran the blockade at Galatz.
4. Stawell Shire Hall destroyed by incendiarism.
7. British ironclad squadron at Corfu ordered to rendezvous at Crete.
7. £10,000 worth of property destroyed by a fire at the Woollen Factory at the Cascades, near Hobart Town.
11. General election of members of the Legislative Assembly resulted in the return of a large majority for the extreme Protectionist party.
11. Thomas J. Bennett, aged 10 years (son of Senior-constable Bennett, of Murchison), presented with the Victorian Humane Society's silver medal for rescuing his sister, aged five years, from drowning in the River Goulburn, when there was a heavy flood in the river. It was the third occasion on which the young hero had saved the lives of children.
11. Tidal disturbances experienced at Sydney, Newcastle, and the east coast of New Zealand. On the same day a sharp shock of earthquake, followed by tidal waves, was felt at San Francisco.
13. The British squadron ordered to Port Said for protection of the Suez Canal.
15. A Russian division crossed the Danube and entered the Dobrudscha.
15. Terrific hurricane in the South Seas. At Tongataboo and Keppel Islands 1000 houses and 16 churches were blown down; the brig "Vision" and the "May Queen" disappeared, and great loss of life occurred.
19. Privy Council allowed the appeal of the Mayor of Essendon, thus making the Melbourne Racecourse liable to municipal assessment.
22. First session of the ninth Parliament of Victoria. Sir Charles Gavan Duffy elected Speaker without opposition.
25. Intercolonial Chess Match. Victoria won three games, New South Wales one, and two were drawn.
25. Demonstration made by the Softas in Constantinople, who demanded Ministerial modifications. The town placed in a state of siege.
28. In a rowing match for £200 a-side, for the championship of the Thames, and the challenge cup given by the proprietors of the *Newcastle Daily Chronicle*, between Robert Watson Boyd, of Gateshead, and John Higgins, of Shadwell, the former won by 20 lengths.
28. Mr. Parkes and Mr. Robertson knighted, and Professor Smith made a C.M.G.
28. Third section of the Gippsland Railway opened for traffic.
29. Rev. Thomas Jones, of Swansea, pastor of the Independent Church, Collins-street, arrived by the "Northumberland."

Notable Events.

MAY—

31. Extensive burglary on the premises of Mr. Goldstein, jeweller and watchmaker, Bourke-street east. Over £1600 worth of property was abstracted by the thieves, who were subsequently arrested, and much of the property recovered. Magistrate highly complimented the Detective Department.

JUNE—

11. Serious collision between two trains at the Spencer-street Railway Station.
15. Fatal mining accident at Stawell, by which Mr. James Grainger, who had contested the election against Mr. Woods, lost his life through being precipitated 300 feet to the bottom of a shaft.
18. Lieutenant-Colonel Sir William Jervois, R.E., appointed Governor of South Australia.
20. Monster shark caught at the entrance to Geelong Bay. It measured 16 feet 6 inches in length, 14 feet in girth, and 9 feet from tips of lateral fins.
22. Rev. Dr. Somerville, of Glasgow, on a tour in the cause of evangelisation, arrived by the "Bangalore."
23. Intercolonial Football Match, Carlton (Victoria) v. Waratah (New South Wales), played at Sydney. There were two matches—one with Rugby and one with Victorian rules. The Victorians lost the former, but retrieved their laurels on the 25th at their own game.
23. Disastrous fire in St. John's, New Brunswick. Damage done to buildings and loss generally estimated at £3,000,000.
28. Colonel St. George Ord appointed Governor of Western Australia, vice Mr. W. C. Robinson, appointed to Straits Settlements.
29. Thirty thousand Russians crossed the Danube.
30. Great sculling match on the Parramatta River, Sydney, for the championship of the world, between Michael Rush, of Grafton, and Edward Trickett, of Sydney. The race created intense excitement, and was witnessed by thousands of spectators. Rush led for a mile, but was overhauled and passed by his opponent, who won easily.
30. For the first time in the history of the Railway Department the annual revenue exceeded one million sterling.

JULY—

1. The Melbourne, Collingwood, and South Melbourne Gas Companies announced by advertisement that gas would be supplied at the uniform rate of 7s. 6d. per 1000 feet.
2. Battle of Kara-Kalissa, resulting in the complete defeat and almost annihilation of the Russians, besides the capture of immense booty.
4. The British squadron went to Besika Bay.
6. Telegraphic messages delivered free within a radius of a mile and a half in any direction from a post-office.
9. Captain Panter's resignation accepted, and the command of the "Cerberus" given to Commander Thomas Colebrooke Mandeville, R.N., an officer who is on the Imperial half-pay list.
11. Mukhtar Pasha effected a junction with the garrison at Kars, raising the siege, and driving the enemy across the frontier.

Notable Events.

JULY—

12. Ninety thousand Russians crossed the Danube at Sistova.
15. Three inches of rain fell in Sydney.
16. A deputation from the Presbyterian body waited on the Church of England Assembly with proposals in the direction of fraternisation on a considerable scale.
18. The Eastern Hill site finally adopted for the Anglican Cathedral by the Church Assembly.
19. Eighteen battalions of Russians crossed the Balkans, and arrived unopposed at Eski Saghra.
21. Railway strike in America. The military were called out, and fired upon the people, killing 10 and wounding 30.
23. Fifty thousand sheep died on one station on the Merri Merri, owing to the drought.
23. Desperate riots at Pittsburg, in America. The militia defeated the rioters, and held the town with arms and cannon. The sheriff of the city was killed.
23. At a Turkish Cabinet meeting, presided over by the Sultan, it was decided, should Russia take Adrianople and advance towards the capital, to unfurl the Prophet's Standard.
27. Geelong and Colac railway opened to Colac.

AUGUST—

1. Mr. Henry Varley, evangelist preacher, arrived from London.
4. At a meeting of the Victorian Institute of Teachers, for the purpose of taking into consideration the circular promulgated by the Minister of Education on the subject of corporal punishment in State schools, it was resolved that the circular was subversive of good discipline, and likely to prove injurious to the interests of education in the colony.
8. The steamship "Lusitania" arrived from London in 39 days less a few minutes (deducting a stay at St. Vincent of 31 hours)—the fastest passage on record. Her maximum day's run was 344 miles, her minimum 273.
13. At special meetings of the shareholders of the Melbourne, Collingwood, and South Melbourne Gas Companies, the terms of agreement of amalgamation were submitted to the shareholders, and carried unanimously by all.
18. The Russian Imperial Guard called out for service, and also all persons capable of bearing arms who have hitherto been exempt.
18. Successful experiments made with Nobell's Patent Dynamite in tree-blasting at Mr. Bent's paddock, Brighton. A tree weighing 20 tons was completely uprooted and shattered by a charge of 3lb. of the powder.
20. Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, Bart., received a telegram announcing his election to the House of Commons for the County of Clare, Ireland, in place of the late Sir Colman O'Loghlen.
21. First trials of lighting Government railway carriages with gas.
21. First trials of using the passengers' signalling apparatus in Government railway carriages.
24. At a great battle, lasting for two days, at the Schipka Pass, the Turks were repulsed with heavy loss.

Notable Events.

AUGUST—

27. The Chinese denizens of Little Bourke street made another attempt to open their illegal lotteries, but without success.
27. Application made to Mr. Justice Fellows, in Chambers, for a *capias* to compel Miss Ada Ward (the celebrated actress) to give security to meet any damages and costs that might be awarded in an action brought against her by a Mr. Ogberne for breach of promise of marriage. His Honour directed the *capias* to be issued, Miss Ward to give security to the amount of £300 before she should leave the colony. The sheriff's officer, however, could not find her, as she had departed on the 25th.
29. On the arrival of the R.M.S. "China" at Galle, from Melbourne, it was discovered that a box containing 5000 sovereigns had been tampered with, and the contents abstracted.
- Councillor Page, of Emerald Hill, Secretary of Building Society, absconded.

SEPTEMBER—

1. William M'Culloch and Co., Limited (a company which took over the business of the well-known firm of Messrs. M'Culloch and Co., carriers and river-steamer owners), started parcels delivery cars in the city and suburbs.
4. Henry Read, town clerk of Warrnambool and secretary of the Warrnambool Permanent Building and Investment Society, absconded.
4. The vexatious stock quarantine regulations at the Murray River done away with.
5. First female clerk in the public service employed by the Adelaide Council of Education.
11. Land Tax Bill passed through its final stages in the Assembly.
11. Break-up of the drought in Victoria and New South Wales.
11. A general assault by the Russians on the Turkish position at Plevna repulsed with a loss of 400 officers and 12,000 men.
12. The Turks made six fierce attacks on the Russian left, recapturing three of their redoubts. The Emperor of Russia, disappointed at the success of his arms, retired to Poredin.
13. Mehemet Ali Pasha defeated the 12th Russian Army Corps with great slaughter, and pursued them to Bonikaloni; Baker Pasha (ex-Colonel Valentine Baker) greatly distinguishing himself.
15. Sulieman Pasha, having crossed the Balkans and advanced to Gabrova, opened a destructive fire on the Russian positions, silenced their batteries, and held the Trajan Road (the direct line from the Balkans to Plevna).
17. The army of the Czarewitch totally withdrawn to the west of the Jantra.
17. News received from Fiji that the notorious Captain ("Bully") Hayes, while trading in a small vessel off the island of Jalmit, had a series of bickerings and quarrels with his mate, and that while in the act of going down the companion-way to get his revolver to shoot the mate, the latter struck him on the back of the head with an iron tiller, completely smashing his skull.

Notable Events.—Wrecks and Casualties.

SEPTEMBER—

17. News received that Colonel Ward, R.E., Deputy-Master of the Mint, did not intend to return to the colony, and had placed his resignation in the hands of the Imperial authorities.
18. Owing to the Legislative Council not dealing with the Land Tax Bill, the Assembly agreed, by 51 votes to 9, to adjourn for a fortnight.
20. The centre and left wings of the Adelaide Lunatic Asylum totally destroyed by fire, and a female patient burned to death. Another female patient stated she had set fire to the building because she was put to sleep with Maori women.
20. The Brisbane Assembly negatived, by a majority of 1, a motion to run trains at convenient times on Sundays.

WRECKS AND CASUALTIES

1876.

8. Schooner "Swallow," 100 tons, Shoalhaven to Geelong, foundered to the west of the River Blyth, Tasmania, two and a half miles from land.

NOVEMBER—

10. Barque "Hero of the Nile," 356 tons, Melbourne to Fremantle, stranded near Point Belcher, south of Garden Island.

DECEMBER—

1. S.S. "Georgette," 210 tons, Fremantle to Adelaide, sprang a leak and foundered 25 miles S.W. of Cape Hamelin. Eight lives were lost.
4. S.S. "Otago" wrecked off Chastland's Mistake, New Zealand, during a dense fog. Passengers, crew, and mails were all saved. The second mate's certificate was suspended for two years for not keeping to the course ordered by the master.
17. Schooner "Postboy," 61 tons, Port Macdonnell to Adelaide, capsized in a sudden squall 12 miles from Glenelg. The captain, two passengers, and three seamen were drowned.
16. Barque "William Ackers," Newcastle to Wellington, wrecked in Foveaux Straits. The captain and six others were drowned.
23. "City of Seringapatam," 1190 tons, London to Melbourne, wrecked at Bona Vista, Cape de Verde Islands. All lives saved.

JANUARY—

1877.

1. News received in Melbourne of the collision between the ship "G. F. Manson" and the steamer "Ambassador." The latter sank in 15 minutes, and 23 of her crew went down in her.
24. Collision between the excursion steamers "Williams" and "Golden Crown," at Queenscliff jetty.

FEBRUARY—

2. "Singapore" wrecked on an unknown reef, half-a-mile west of Lone Island.

Wrecks and Casualties.

FEBRUARY—

5. S.S. "Argyle" ran ashore at Warrnambool, but was got off again with the assistance of the s.s. "Lubra."
6. The new steam dredge "Willunga," belonging to the South Australian Government, run into and sunk by the steamer "Victoria." She was eventually floated.
7. S.S. "Queenscliff" ran ashore at Swan Bay. She was got off again on the 10th.
13. Barque "Samuel Merritt" went ashore on the North Spit, while crossing the bar at Ballina.
18. "Bessie," "Cingalee," "Helen Malcolm," "Aboyne," "Albert Victor," and "Isabella," driven ashore at Lacepede Islands during a hurricane. The two former were got off and brought round to Fremantle.

MARCH—

7. Barque "Peony," Newcastle to Sydney, went ashore four miles south of Richmond Heads. The captain and four men were drowned.
17. "City of Foo Chow," Sydney to Calcutta, wrecked on the N.E. of Flinders Island, Bass's Straits. All hands saved.
19. "Ocean Mail" 1039 tons, Wellington to London, wrecked on one of the Chatham Islands, about 350 miles from New Zealand. Her cargo, principally wool (4,904 bales), was valued at £78,000. No lives lost.

APRIL—

9. Schooner "S. M. Stetson," Newcastle to San Francisco, coal laden, sprang a leak when 400 miles to the eastward of Cape Howe. The captain beached her on Howe Island.
21. Three-masted schooner "Adonis," Bundalberg to Cairns, wrecked off Green Island.
22. Survey gig (manned by William Cogdon, Thomas King, Edward Price, and George Leggat), under the command of John Norgate, sen., an old and experienced sailor, while engaged in transferring the mailbag from Goose Island to H.M.C.S. "Victoria," capsized, and all on board perished. None of the bodies were ever recovered.
30. Barque "Haddra," 316 tons, Lacepede Islands to Fremantle, wrecked on the eastern group of Abrolhos.

MAY—

1. Schooner "Resolute," Richmond River to Sydney, went ashore at Broken Bay.
15. Brig "Emily Smith," King George's Sound to Adelaide, wrecked near West Bay, and 21 people drowned.
18. Barque "Feronia" wrecked at Kaipara Heads.
28. Schooner "Bravo" sprang a leak off Cape Schanck, and was beached at Waratah Bay.
- Three-masted schooner "Young Australian" went ashore at the mouth of Curdie's Inlet, about 35 miles to the eastward of Warrnambool.

JUNE—

9. Ship "Winchester," Adelaide to Calcutta, wrecked off False Point. The American ship "Privateer" rescued the crew, and took them to Calcutta.

JUNE—

10. Barque "Italy," Hobart Town to Sydney, stranded at Wreck Bay during thick weather. The crew and all movables were saved.
11. "Star of the Mersey," Lyttelton to Newcastle, encountered a fearful gale near Guard Island, and was abandoned by the crew. She disappeared during the night, but was picked up three days afterwards a few miles from where it was stated she had disappeared, and towed into Wellington uninjured.
16. S.S. "Ballina" came into collision with and sunk the barque "Sylphide," Portland Bay to Sydney, half a mile south of Long Reef. All hands on board were saved.
18. S.S. "Lubra," whilst entering the harbour at Warrnambool, was struck by a blind roller and carried on to the end of the reef, a hole being thus knocked in her hull near the bows. Finding the water rapidly gaining, Captain Ashton beached her between the two jetties. After being repaired from the inside she was towed to Melbourne by the tug "Albatross."
19. Brig "Peri" sprang a leak and foundered off Breakwater Spit, Brisbane. The crew were picked up by the schooner "Rip."
28. Brig "Maid of Erin," Curphey master, wrecked at Port Davey. The crew were rescued.

JULY—

14. Schooner "Jessie Henderson" lost at Ramsay Island, South Seas.
15. S.S. "Yarra Yarra" foundered at Newcastle, with 18 men on board.
16. Collision between the steamer "Andalusia," of Glasgow, and the "Angerona," ship, of Liverpool. The latter vessel was towed into port seriously injured.
28. Barque "Gloster," Newcastle to Japan, coal laden, sprang a leak 70 miles off Port Stephens, and foundered within 30 miles of Smoky Cape.

AUGUST—

7. "Queen Bee," ship, London to Nelson, struck on the Farewell Spit, Massacre Bay, N.Z., and broke her back. One man was drowned.
26. "Alcandre," brigantine, stranded in Waratah Bay.

SEPTEMBER—

9. S.S. "Lord Ashley," Newcastle to Melbourne, went ashore close to the entrance of Terrigal boat harbour, about five miles north of Cape Three Points, and broke in two.

18. At London, Mr. Edmund Westby (formerly of Melbourne). Aged 72.
27. In England, Mr. Allan Spowers, one of the proprietors of the *Argus*. Aged 61.

11. News received by telegram from London of the death of Lady MacMahon.
13. Mr. William Barrett, an old and wealthy colonist. Arrived in Melbourne in 1838, and was the first auctioneer in the city.
24. Rev. John Barlow, incumbent of St. John's Church, Latrobe-street west. Aged 54.
31. News received by telegram from London of the death of Lord Lisgar (Sir John Young), for six years Governor of New South Wales.

NOVEMBER—

6. News received in Melbourne of the death of ex-Sultan Murad.

DECEMBER—

5. Mr. James John Blundell, sen. (formerly of the well-known printing and stationery firm of Blundell and Ford). Aged 57.
17. Mr. George Burrell, secretary to the Pilot Board of Victoria. Aged 65.
26. Mr. D. G. Jones, proprietor of the *Pastoral Times* and *Hay Standard*, the former of which he founded twenty years ago. He took an active part in the establishment of the Deniliquin and Moama Railway Company.
30. Mr. Matthew M'Caw (of M'Caw, Adamson and Co.), an old colonist, who for some years took part in the politics of the colony. Aged 61.

JANUARY—

1877.

8. Mr. Matthew Marwood, of the late firm of Lorimer, Marwood and Rome. Aged 44.
11. Mr. Richard Davies Ireland (Queen's Counsel), the talented defender of the Ballarat rioters. Among such compeers as Messrs. Fellows, Stephen, Michie, Sewell, Sitwell, Dawson, Aspinall, Higinbotham, and Holroyd, he distinguished himself as a brilliant and successful pleader. He was a member of several Ministries, and was in the receipt of a pension of £1000 a year from the Victorian Government. Aged 61.
28. Mr. T. Lambert, tanner; a colonist of 24 years' standing, a Justice of the Peace, and was a member of the Legislative Assembly during the time Mr. Heales was in power. Aged 48.

FEBRUARY—

1. Mr. W. H. Wright, who for a number of years occupied the position of principal sheriff of the colony. Aged 63.
3. Rev. J. Martin, minister of the Baptist Church, Collins-street. Died in Tasmania, whither he had gone for a month's holiday.
9. Mr. Edward Jenkins, Parliamentary and general agent. Aged 46.
10. Mr. Lawrence Henty, only son of Mr. Frank Henty, of Merino Downs, and one of the pioneers of Victoria.
21. Mr. Samuel Ramsden, an old and esteemed colonist.

FEBRUARY—

25. Sir Jung Bahadur, an independent Indian Prince, Rajah of Nepaul. His three widows (Ranees) could not be dissuaded from entering the funeral pyre, and were burnt alive with his corpse.

MARCH—

16. The Most Rev. Dr. Polding, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Sydney. The rev. prelate had during a long residence in New South Wales gained the esteem of people of all sects, being visited in his last illness by the Bishop of Sydney (Dr. Barker) and other Protestant clergymen. Aged 83.

APRIL—

13. Hon. Edward Cohen, treasurer of the Melbourne Hospital and a leading citizen. He arrived in New South Wales in 1833. In 1842 he came to Melbourne and joined Mr. B. Francis in the business of auctioneer. The partnership having been carried on for a number of years successfully, both members of the firm retired from business. Seeking Parliamentary honours, he was returned for East Melbourne, and never suffered defeat in any subsequent election for that constituency. He was Treasurer of the colony under several administrations, and held high offices in the Jewish community. Aged 55.
23. Mr. Edward Wild, a member of the late firm of Vaughan and Wild, brewers, and well known in Melbourne as a most ardent lover of music. Aged 71.
30. Mr. James Jordan, of Williamstown. He joined the army in 1809, and was engaged in the battles of Talavera, Bayonne, Badajos, Toulouse, Vittoria, Pyrenees, and Waterloo; and was one of the soldiers who carried Lord Hill out of a ravine when wounded. Aged 86.

MAY—

22. Mr. Joseph M'Lean, one of the partners of the well-known firm of M'Lean Brothers and Rigg, ironmongers. He had been a resident in Victoria for over a quarter of a century, and was for many years in the employment of Messrs. James M'Ewan and Co. He was a leading member of the Odd-fellows' Society, and was also connected with the Masonic body. Aged 36.

JUNE—

14. Mr. James Linacre, a successful old colonist. He arrived in Melbourne in 1844, and, in partnership with Messrs. Kennon and Hughes, undertook the building of the gaol and court-houses at Portland. He next completed Prince's Bridge from the keystone upwards, and erected Williamstown Lighthouse, and St. Paul's Church, Swanston-street. In conjunction with his brother, Mr. A. Linacre, he constructed the Melbourne Club and the south wing of the Public Library.
19. At London, Admiral Rous, the great sporting authority and handicapper. He had been connected with the English Turf over 50 years. Aged 80.
24. Viscount Canterbury (Sir J. H. T. Manners-Sutton), who succeeded Sir Charles Darling in the Governorship of Victoria in 1866. Aged 63.

JULY—

8. Mr. H. S. Walsh, of Walsh Brothers, jewellers, Collins-street. He arrived in Victoria in 1849, and took an active interest in public affairs. He entered the City Council in 1852; was alderman for Hotham Ward, and filled the office of Mayor of the city in 1858-9. He was the first chairman of the City of Melbourne Gas Company. Aged 72.
14. Mr. David Young, for several years treasurer of the Melbourne Benevolent Asylum. He arrived in the colony in 1839. Aged 80.
18. Lieut.-Colonel Joseph Anderson, C.B., K.H.; an old Peninsular and Indian hero, who had seen much active service with the 50th (Queen's Own). Aged 88.
30. Mr. James Bell, of Woolbrook station, Teesdale; an early and successful settler.

SEPTEMBER—

4. M. Louis Adolphe Thiers, the distinguished French statesman and historian. Aged 81.
